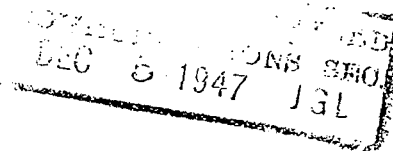

Dear *b6, 7c*

Reference is made to the above entitled criminal treason prosecution presently pending on appeal in the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit, at San Francisco. The defendant is more popularly known to some as "Tokyo Rose."

The Department acknowledges receipt of yours of the 11th instant. This Department during the trial of this case in the United States District Court was only in possession of a few recordings which were monitorings of the defendant's broadcasts. These recordings are now in the custody of the Clerk of the Court of Appeals and may not be released until the above mentioned litigation is finally disposed of by all the Federal Appellate Courts, including the Supreme Court of the United States, should the case go that far.

It is suggested that you may desire to correspond with the National Archivist, Washington, D.C. who may be in a position to furnish you with the desired information which was the subject matter of your letter. It is with extreme regret that we inform you that this Department is unable to be of any assistance to you in connection with your request.

Dear Dr. Irvine:

Reference is made to your letter of August 4, 1950, concerning the inquiry of ^{b6, 7c} Kent, Ohio, as to the availability of recordings of broadcasts made by Iva Toguri D'Aquino ("Tokyo Rose") and other American citizens over Axis-controlled radio stations during the war. You requested to be advised whether this Department has any objection to your sending ^{b6, 7c} re-recordings of security copies of broadcasts by Iva D'Aquino and particularly of the "Zero Hour" broadcast of August 14, 1944.

As you may know, the D'Aquino case is now on appeal to the Circuit Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. Therefore, it is felt that it would not be proper for this Department to sanction the release or re-recording of any broadcasts of Iva D'Aquino at this time, since such action would be subject to criticism by the courts, which look with disfavor upon the release to the public of any evidence in a case prior to its final determination on appeal. However, where treason cases have been finally disposed of on appeal, as in the cases of ^{b6, 7c} this Department would have no objection to your utilizing re-recordings of their broadcasts in any manner which you deem appropriate.

Dear [b6, 7C]

Reference is made to your letter of March 8, 1950, requesting information as to where you may obtain recordings of the broadcasts of Tokyo Rose and Lord Haw Haw for use in a psychological warfare course which you are conducting.

I regret that it is not possible to make available to you at this time copies of the recordings of broadcasts of Tokyo Rose and other American citizens who have been convicted of treason as a result of their broadcasting activities over Axis-controlled radios during the war. The cases involving these persons are now on appeal. Such recordings as were introduced in evidence at the trials in the lower courts have been transmitted to the appropriate appellate court as a part of the record on appeal and must remain in the custody of the clerk of that court until a final decision is made in the matter. However, it is possible that the Division of Photographic Records, The National Archives, Washington, D.C., may be able to assist you in ascertaining if there are any available recordings of the broadcasts of the British citizen, Lord Haw Haw.

Re: Iva Toguri D'Aquino v. United States

Reference is made to the above-entitled treason prosecution presently pending on appeal in the Court of Appeals for your circuit. The Department acknowledges receipt of and thanks you for yours of the 10th instant addressed to Tom DeWolfe of this Division with respect to the obtainment of information concerning an endorsement with reference to the actual dates on which *b6, 7c* was in attendance upon the trial of this cause on its merits as a government witness. The matter has been discussed with Messrs. DeWolfe, Knapp and Hogan and *b6, 7c* all of whom worked with you in connection with the preparation for and trial of this cause. A search of the records here fails to disclose the actual dates during which *b6, 7c* was in attendance in San Francisco as aforesaid. It is known from a perusal of the official correspondence available here that said witness arrived in San Francisco on or about 1 July 1949 and was excused by Mr. DeWolfe on or about 15 July 1949.

Messrs. Knapp and DeWolfe discussed with you the advisability of placing witness *b6, 7c* on the stand and it was decided by all concerned that *b6, 7c* should not take the stand as a government witness. He was released on orders of Mr. DeWolfe and authorized to proceed back to his then station which was New York City. It is believed that he was released on or about 15 July 1949 and that one of the staff from the Department endorsed the Corporal's orders placing thereon the actual dates on which he was in attendance at your office and upon the trial proceedings as ordered by his superiors in the Department of the Army.

It is not known here whether b6, 7C per diem was paid by the marshal for your district or whether he was advanced per diems for subsistence or in lieu thereof by the finance officer at the presidio.

It is suggested that it would be well to have someone in your office check with the marshal and/or the finance officer at the presidio with the view in mind of obtaining information as to the exact dates this witness was in San Francisco for the purposes aforementioned. If the marshal or the finance officer at the presidio are not in possession of any information as to the exact dates during which b6 7C was in San Francisco it is believed that it would be well for you to write Ft. Sam Houston in an endeavor to ascertain whether the dates of b6 7C attendance at San Francisco are not endorsed upon his orders. If none of the above suggestions solve the question involved it might be appropriate for b6, 7C to execute an affidavit as to the exact dates he was in San Francisco and possibly Mr. DeWolfe or Mr. Knapp will then be in a position to refresh their recollections and certify as to the actual dates of his attendance before you and the court last summer.

It is regretted that the problem involved cannot be solved in an easier fashion. Please rest assured that your cooperation herein is greatly appreciated by the Department.

The Department is returning herewith one copy of the letter to you from the Personnel officer at Ft. Sam Houston dated 27 April 1950 together with one copy of the enclosure therein referred to. The enclosures are self-explanatory.

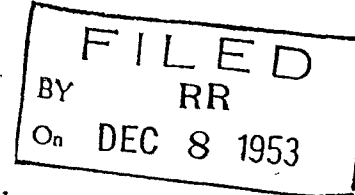

Re: United States v. Daquino

Dear Mr. DeWolfe:

In the appellant's points and authorities in support of application for bail, she has argued that the trial court erred in refusing to order the Government to make available to the defense a Federal Bureau of Investigation report which was mentioned by either Special Agent *bb, 7C* or *bb, 7C* on the cross-examination to his rebuttal testimony. You undoubtedly will recall the incident.

At the time the defendant made the demand for the production of the report in question, the matter was taken up in the chambers of Judge Roche and you produced the report and argued against being required to give it to the defendant. It would seem that the record should show, if possible, what transpired in the conference with Judge Roche, since it might be of assistance to us in arguing the matter on appeal. Perhaps you and Judge Roche will recall whether at that time the judge examined the F.B.I. report to determine whether the witness had given any testimony which was contradictory to statements contained in the report. If Judge Roche did so examine the report, the record should so state. It is also suggested that a court reporter may have been present and that the proceedings in the chambers may have been taken down.

Will you kindly look into this matter and see what can be done about correcting the record in this respect.

Reference is made to the above entitled federal criminal treason prosecution recently concluded in the United States Court for the Federal Northern Judicial District of California, at San Francisco. Defendant was indicted by a federal grand jury at San Francisco in October, 1948.

b6, 7C a Japanese national, and government witness before the grand jury and at the trial on the merits in San Francisco last summer, was first brought to the United States by the Department of the Army, at the request of this Department, in September, 1948. He arrived in the United States at that time for the purpose of preparing for and testifying at the grand jury proceedings aforementioned. He returned to Japan in October, 1948 subsequent to the return of the indictment herein.

The attendance of b6, 7C in the United States again became necessary for purposes of preparation for and giving testimony as a government witness at the trial on the merits in San Francisco last summer. He arrived in the United States in June, 1949 through the medium of transportation furnished by the Department of the Army at the request of the Department of Justice, for trial purposes. Prior to b6, 7C departure for the United States as a government witness last summer it is understood that he had received State Department approval to remain in the United States at the conclusion of the trial of the above entitled case, for the purpose of attending the University of California at Berkeley. His passport, visa, and the unused portion of his round trip return ticket to Japan are presently in the temporary custody of the United States Marshal at San Francisco.

Upon the rendition of a verdict in the above entitled case Japanese witness b6, 7C was transported by this Department to the Southern District of New York at New York City, for the purpose of testifying before a grand jury there in a prospective companion treason prosecution styled United States v. John D. Provo. His testimony in the Provo case before the federal grand jury in New York has been concluded and this Division is now returning witness b6, 7C to San Francisco where it is understood that he will continue his studies in the Bay area at the University of California. His attendance in the Southern District of New York as a trial witness on behalf of the United States will undoubtedly become necessary in the immediate future when that case is set for trial on its merits

I am advised by the United States Attorney and by Tom DeWolfe, who was in charge of the prosecution of D'Aquino, that the valuable services of Special Agent *bb, 7C* contributed greatly to the outcome of the trial.

As you know, the treason trial of Iva Foguri D'Aquino, which began on July 5, 1949, resulted in a verdict of guilty on September 29, 1949, and the defendant has since been sentenced.

The United States Attorney, Frank J. Hennesey, and Tom DeWolfe, who was in charge of the prosecution of D'Aquino, have advised me that the successful outcome of this important treason case is due to a large extent to the excellent assistance rendered to the Government during the investigation, the grand jury proceedings, and the trial, by Special Agent *b6, 7C* Special Agent *b6, 7C* you will recall, also served the United States to great advantage in the successful treason prosecutions of *b6, 7C* and *b6, 7C*. 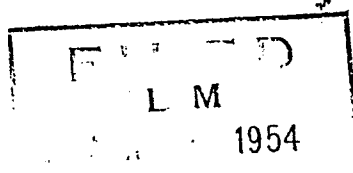

Reference is made to the telephone conversation of last week between you and Mr. Franke regarding the following three Japanese witnesses who are presently in San Francisco on the D'Aguiño case and their subsequent transfer to the East Coast in order that they may testify in the Provoce case which is presently pending in the Southern District of New York:

b6, 7C

It is anticipated that the D'Aguiño trial will be completed by Friday, September 23, 1949.

In accordance with the decision reached, it is requested that the Marshal in San Francisco be notified by wire, immediately, that the above-mentioned witnesses be retained in San Francisco for a period of approximately two weeks and paid by that Marshal's office. This office will notify the Marshal as to the exact date on which these witnesses are to be sent to Washington, D. C. via rail. The necessary GTR's are to be furnished by the Marshal in San Francisco to cover rail transportation to Washington, D. C.

b6,7c is a dual national having British as well as Japanese citizenship. b6,7c had heard a report that she might be testifying for the defense, but I take it from DeWolfe's letter that such was not the case.

In any event I do not see how the Department can put itself in the position of initiating any legislation on b6,7c behalf. She is at best in the same position as every witness we have brought over from Japan and Germany, and there appear to be no special circumstances warranting extraordinary action in her behalf. We have taken the position and intend to reaffirm it after conclusion of the Burgman case that witnesses should be returned to their country of origin after their services have been completed. In any case we intend to advise the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization that the Department no longer requests that witnesses should be allowed to remain in the United States or that their visitors' permits be extended or, further, that the Department will have any responsibility for them. As you know, there are many Germans in the United States who have been allowed to remain as possible witnesses in the Burgman trial. Because the number of overt acts was severely cut down, I believe that many of these Germans could be returned at once. The Internal Security Section has not advised I&NS as yet, however, because it is believed that Mr. Woerheide should have an opportunity to determine whether he has need for any of these witnesses.

Re: United States v. *b6, 7c* ; Treason

Reference is made to telephone conversation between Mr. John Hogan in San Francisco and Mr. William E. Foley in Washington, in which the status of the witnesses *b6, 7c* and *b6, 7c* was discussed as to action which should be taken upon their release from the payroll in connection with the Iva Toguri D'Aquino case. Mr. Andretta, Administrative Assistant to the Attorney General, has authorized payment to these witnesses from the date of their release in connection with the D'Aquino case, and their use in a grand jury proceeding in connection with the *b6, 7c* treason case.

The presence of these witnesses in Washington will not be required until the arrival of other Japanese witnesses requested from Japan. It is expected that the witnesses requested from Japan will arrive in Washington between the 5th and 15th of October. Mr. Andretta's office has this date wired authority to the United States Marshal in San Francisco to continue *b6, 7c* on the payroll until he receives notification from this office to send said witnesses to Washington. ¹ It is our understanding that *b6, 7c* has agreed to remain in California and continue his studies at the University of California until such date as he is needed in Washington. If it is agreeable with *b6, 7c* to remain in California without pay, it is requested that he leave an address with the United States Marshal in San Francisco so that he may be immediately notified to proceed to Washington. ² *b6, 7c* should also leave with the Marshal an address at which they can be reached at all times, so that they may be alerted for their trip to Washington at or about the time of the arrival of the Japanese witnesses from Japan.

One *b6, 7c* an employee of the Navy Department, contacted the Criminal Division this date on reading of the statements of certain G.I. defense witnesses in the prosecution of Iva Toguri D'Aquino to the effect that her broadcasts over the Japanese short wave radio had had no effect on American troops.

b6, 7c had several times listened to broadcasts by Tokyo Rose and remembered particularly a broadcast naming a buddy of his in which she said that the buddy's wife was going around with another man. The statement so affected the other man that he became highly nervous and jumped out of his foxhole and was immediately mowed down by Japanese gunfire.

It is assumed that such information, especially at this late date in the trial, will be of no use to you, but it is being furnished as part of the facts relating to the case.

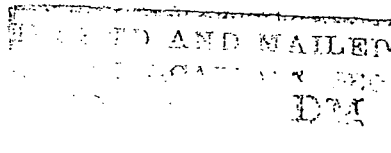

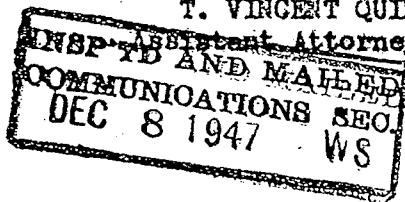
