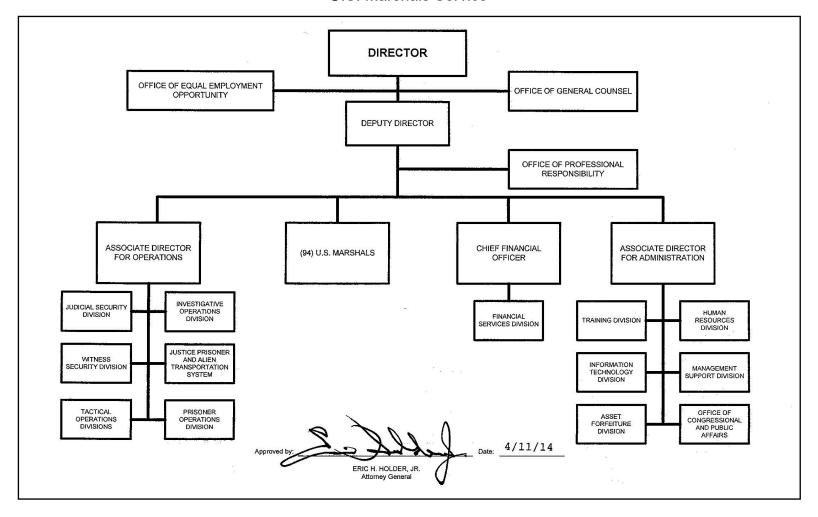
Organizational Chart

Status of Congressionally Requested Studies, Reports, and Evaluations

U.S. Marshals Service Salaries and Expenses

- 1. The Senate Report associated with the Departments of Commerce and Justice, Science, and Related Agencies Appropriations Bill, 2021, page 94, recommends that the Assets Forfeiture Fund (AFF) report proceeds as follows: "The Committee directs the Department to continue to provide quarterly reports on the USMS's use of AFF funding, as directed in Senate Report 116-127 and adopted by Public Law 116-93."
- 2. The Senate Report associated with the Departments of Commerce and Justice, Science, and Related Agencies Appropriations Bill, 2021, page 94-95, recommends the following: "the Committee directs the USMS to submit a report, not later than 180 days after the date of enactment of this Act, on the possible expansion of the RFTF program. This report should describe requirements with respect to staffing, operational space and agreements, equipment, tactical canine teams, medical and trauma support and partnerships. and expected future resource needs. This report should further identify the geographic regions that would benefit most from establishment of an RFTF."
- 3. The Senate Report associated with the Departments of Commerce and Justice, Science, and Related Agencies Appropriations Bill, 2021, page 95, recommends the following: The Committee directs the USMS to submit an updated annual report on its extradition program and international operations workload as directed by the explanatory statement accompanying Public Law 116-93. The report should detail the number of extraditions, deportations, district cooperations, and extradition requests made by foreign counterparts. The report should further describe any plans for expansion to locations where USMS does not yet have a permanent presence, but where there has been an increase in workload due to extraditions. DOJ is directed to assess unobligated resources available Department-wide, and to submit a reprogramming of funding, if required, to cover the full costs of meeting USMS' international extradition responsibilities."
- 4. The Senate Report associated with the Departments of Commerce and Justice, Science, and Related Agencies Appropriations Bill, 2021, page 96, recommends as follows: "That in an effort to better streamline training operations, the Committee directs that USMS submit a report, within 90 days of enactment of this act, describing ways of improving training efficiencies by consolidating these functions in one centralized location, as well as the associated resource requirements."
- 5. The Joint Explanatory Statement, page 69, directs that "The Department shall continue to submit the quarterly report required by the explanatory statement accompanying Public Law 116-93, on USMS use of Assets Forfeiture Fund funding."
- 6. The Joint Explanatory Statement, page 69-70, directs the USMS "to submit a report, not later than 180 days after the date of enactment of this Act, on the possible expansion of the RFTF program. This report should describe requirements with respect to staffing, operational space and agreements, equipment, tactical canine teams, medical and trauma support and partnerships. and expected future resource needs. This report should further identify the geographic regions that would benefit most from establishment of an RFTF."
- 7. The Joint Explanatory Statement, page 70, directs the USMS "to submit an updated annual report on its extradition program and international operations workload as directed by the explanatory statement accompanying Public Law 116-93. The report should detail the number of extraditions, deportations, district cooperations, and extradition requests made by foreign counterparts. The report should further describe any plans for expansion to locations where USMS does not yet have a permanent presence, but where there has been an increase in workload due to extraditions. DOJ is directed to assess unobligated resources available Department-wide, and to submit a reprogramming of funding, if required, to cover the full costs of meeting USMS' international extradition responsibilities."
- 8. The Joint Explanatory Statement, page 70, directs the USMS "to assess whether consolidation of its training programs in one centralized location could streamline training operations and deliver efficiencies and savings. USMS is further directed to submit a report on its findings, as well as estimates of the resource requirements to implement such consolidation, not later than 90 days after the date of enactment of this Act."
