- MPD- Biggest group of protestors is located at Lafayette Square. Several thousand individuals who are peacefully protesting. Confirmed reports of protestors having gas masks.
- National Guard- US at large: total forces 21,809 with a presence in 27 states to respond to civil disturbances. CA is experience most dense number of issues. Guards are armed with rounds in the chamber. Texas also looking for more support. CO looking for more support. In Utah there was an attack on a Humvee in Salt Lake City. Illinois is seeing surges in Chicago. A police vehicle in Pennsylvania was set afire in an armory. National Guard plans to posture more security around there and airfields as opposed to neighborhoods. DC National Guard- 1104 guardians in the field mostly around monuments and metro police. Also have inbound guards from states to help- sending 2506 troops total. On in DC they have 255 from outside support. Title 10 response- at 14:00 today 1312 troops from Ft. Bragg and Ft. Carson arrived and are in process through Andrews Air Force Base.

- “The Department considers a number of factors in determining the appropriate remedy to resolve a pattern or practice of constitutional violations by a law enforcement agency. It is the mission of the Justice Department to ‘ensure public safety,’ and we will continue to encourage the proven, Constitutional, and proactive policing required to keep American neighborhoods safe from violent crime.”

The memo does not change the terms of any existing consent decree and existing consent decrees are not any less binding.”

The department currently has three open investigations.

- Text of the Order: “By virtue of the powers vested in me as Deputy Attorney General, including the authorities and powers described in *In re Neagle*, 135 US 1, 65 (1890), I hereby authorize the Director of the United States Marshals Service to take all reasonable and necessary actions, in response to nationwide violent unrest, to enforce federal criminal statutes and protect federal property and personnel.
