Status of Congressionally Requested Studies, Reports, and Evaluations

1. The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "BOP is directed to report to the Committees not later than 30 days after the date of enactment of this Act on how it is implementing the recommendations in the March 2020 OIG Management Advisory Memorandum (MAM) on food procurement to ensure such food meets contract specifications and does not endanger the health of inmates and staff. BOP is further directed to examine how it can leverage contracts and services with local and regional businesses, including farmers, ranchers, food processors and other food vendors in order to lower costs while providing higher quality meals, and report on its findings not later than 180 days after the date of enactment of this Act."

2. The House Report (H. Rept. 116-455) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "The Committee recognizes the constraints BOP is under when operating prison facilities during the pandemic. The Committee acknowledges the parameters for home confinement have been outlined by the First Step Act, the CARES Act, and by memos issued by the Attorney General. The Committee is concerned about the total low percentage of inmates released, particularly at facilities with high numbers of positive cases. Therefore, the Committee urges BOP to brief the Committee within 30 days of the date of enactment of this Act on the status of efforts to increase home confinement as a response during the pandemic."

Further, The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "In lieu of the House report language, the agreement directs BOP to submit a report, not later than 60 days after the date of enactment of this Act, on home confinement and compassionate release. This report shall address the eligibility determination process, as well as implementation of home confinement-related provisions of the First Step Act and the Attorney General's memoranda dated March 26, 2020, and April 3, 2020. The report should further provide an update required by the explanatory statement accompanying Public Law 116-93."

3. The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "In lieu of House section 551, BOP is directed to report to the Committees, no later than 60 days after the date of enactment of this Act, on its current and planned efforts to notify persons in RRCs of the procedures for applying for subsistence fee waivers.

4. The House Report (H. Rept. 116-455) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "The Committee recognizes the importance of mental health and wellness for correctional officers and directs BOP to report to the Committee, not later than 90 days after enactment of this Act, on its efforts to provide mental health services for staff currently and in the future."

5. The House Report (H. Rept. 116-455) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "The Committee recognizes BOP needs to keep its skilled employees but is aware of the financial cost associated with hiring, training, and retaining them. Therefore, the Committee directs DOJ to study the pay disparities between BOP employees and their counterparts in other agencies and report its findings to the Committee, not later than 90 days after enactment of this Act, including recommendations on how to retain employees."

6. The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "BOP shall report not later than 90 days after the date of enactment of this Act on the number of vacancies at each facility, further detailed by job title, job series, and General Schedule level as well as the number of applicants going through the hiring process for each vacant position. DOJ is directed to explore ways to expedite BOP hiring, such as working with OPM to provide expedited hiring for BOP facilities with vacancy rates exceeding ten percent and making use of recruitment and retention bonuses. BOP shall describe such efforts in the aforementioned report."

7. The House Report (H. Rept. 116-455) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "The Committee remains concerned about the rising use of contraband cellular phones and devices in facilities administered by BOP or under contract with them. Such devices facilitate criminal activity and threaten the safety of correctional officers and staff, other inmates, and the public, to include being used by inmates to carry out financial scams and sextortion of innocent citizens. It is essential that incarcerated individuals are denied access to the networks and spectrum that enable such illicit activity. The recommendation includes funding requested to interdict illicit cell phone use and directs BOP to act on the recommendations of its fiscal year 2016 report to Congress, to include, as appropriate, managed access or other technology, to thwart illegal inmate telecommunications while not interfering with legitimate spectrum use."

Further, The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "The agreement supports the budget request for contraband cellphone detection technology. BOP is directed to submit, not later than 180 days after the date of enactment of this Act, either a detailed plan for the deployment of a whole-complex jamming pilot, or an exhaustive explanation of the rationale, including health and safety considerations, that would necessarily preclude such a deployment."

8. "The House Report (H. Rept. 116-455) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "BOP is directed to develop and submit to the Committee a report, not later than 180 days after enactment of this Act, that (1) includes a cost estimate and strategic plan for implementing this standard for United States Penitentiaries, Administrative and Federal Detention Centers, and Witness Security Program (WITSEC) units that house high security inmates, but do not have a second officer on all three shifts as part of their mission critical roster; (2) reflects the cost to add officers, rather than simply reassign them; and (3) identifies all Housing Units that currently house high security inmates within the general population. This report shall be broken down by institution, State, and region."

9. The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "BOP is directed to implement and expand solutions, like those that allow photographs or handwritten letters to be scanned and reprinted at secure off-site locations and mailed directly to a correctional facility, or allow digital photographs and letters to be uploaded through a website or app and then printed at and mailed from a secure location, which are capable of eliminating the risk of contraband while maintaining inmates' access to mail from friends and family. Such solutions should not require additional equipment or changes to current infrastructure, should address any specific concerns relating to legal mail, and should ensure the highest degree of fidelity between the facsimiles and the originals. BOP is further directed to report, within 180 days of the enactment of this Act, on the status of these pilot programs, the resources needed to further expand solutions to mitigate the threat of contraband in mail to inmates, and to identify those resources requirements [sic] in its fiscal year 2022 budget request."

10. The House Report (H. Rept. 116-455) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "The Committee considers Land Mobile Radio (LMR) communications and video security equipment used by BOP to be critical to officer and inmate safety and security at BOP facilities. In an environment where other alternative forms of communication and security measures cannot be employed, LMR and video security continue to be the only safe and secure methods for BOP facilities and personnel. The Committee is concerned that the age of 74 of the 100 LMR systems and more than 19,000 portable and mobile radios currently in use is causing them to become increasingly unreliable and difficult to maintain due to limited parts availability and serviceability. Therefore, the Committee urges BOP, within funding provided, to invest in necessary radio and video security upgrades. The Committee also urges BOP to build into its future year budget requests funding to refresh LMR radios and video security systems in facilities where aging communications infrastructure and equipment pose a threat to officer safety."

Further, The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "BOP is directed to develop a plan to update LMR and video security systems in facilities where aging communications infrastructure and equipment pose a threat to officer safety, and to submit the plan to the Committees not later than 180 days after the date of enactment of this Act."

11. The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "BOP is directed to report to the Committees not later than 30 days after the date of enactment of this Act on how it is implementing the recommendations in the March 2020 OIG Management Advisory Memorandum (MAM) on food procurement to ensure such food meets contract specifications and does not endanger the health of inmates and staff. BOP is further directed to examine how it can leverage contracts and services with local and regional businesses, including farmers, ranchers, food processors and other food vendors in order to lower costs while providing higher quality meals, and report on its findings not later than 180 days after the date of enactment of this Act."

12. The House Report (H. Rept. 116-455) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "The Committee recognizes the incarcerated population faces significantly higher risks of acquiring a communicable disease, as demonstrated during the current COVID 19 pandemic. BOP policy requires that Federally managed and contract prison protocols include an assessment of inmate immunizations and the provision of basic medical care, including hepatitis B and C testing and treatment, as well as preventive health services such as immunizations. However, the DOJ Office of Inspector General (OIG) reported in 2016 that some BOP facilities, in particular contract prisons, were not complying with this policy. The Committee understands that the pandemic has imposed unforeseen burdens in administering inmate immunizations and wants to better understand how BOP is dealing with such challenges. The Committee directs the Department to report not later than 270 days after enactment of the Act on the progress, across both Federal and contract prisons, of efforts to achieve compliance with the protocols since the 2016 OIG report. The report should identify gaps in services and barriers to provision of immunization services; identify potential collaborations with health organizations to address identified disparities; and recommend ways to close them. Further, the Director of BOP is urged to develop guidelines that include a comprehensive testing protocol, and precautionary measures with respect to sanitation and hygiene, including frequent cleaning and ready availability of soap and tissues."

13. The JointSenate Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "The Committee previously directed BOP is directed to continue to ensure at least two correctional officers are on duty for each housing unit for all three shifts at all high-security institutions, to includinge United States Penitentiaries and Administrative and Federal Detention Centers. BOP is directed to continue to submit quarterly reports to the Committee showing compliance with this directive and to provide a cost estimate and strategic plan for implementation for medium-security institutions that currently do not have a second officer for all three shifts."

Further, the House Report (H. Rept. 116-455) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "—The Committee directs BOP to continue to submit quarterly reports on the inmate-to-correctional officer ratio at each facility, using the OPM definition of a corrections officer, broken out by security level and shift, including confirmation that at least two correctional officers are on duty for each shift at BOP facilities that house high security inmates, as specified in the fiscal year 2020 Appropriations Act."

14. The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "BOP is expected to hire additional full-time correctional officers in order to reduce the overreliance on augmentation and improve staffing beyond mission-critical levels in custody and all other departments, including medical, counseling, and educational positions. BOP shall provide quarterly reports to the Committees on the use of augmentation broken out by region, institution, and security level for each time such practice is employed."

Further, the House Report (H. Rept. 116-455) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "Overcrowding remains a serious threat to Correctional Officer safety, particularly at medium and high-security facilities. To meet staffing needs, BOP routinely relies on the practice of augmentation or reassignment, whereby a non-custody correctional employee is assigned custody responsibilities. The Committee directs BOP to continue to hire more full-time Correctional Officers until such augmentation or reassignment is no longer needed, and to improve staffing beyond mission-critical levels in custody and all other departments."

15. The House Report (H. Rept. 116-455) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "The Committee is concerned with reports that during the March 2020 lockdown at the Metropolitan Correctional Center (MCC) in New York, NY, detainees experienced interrupted access to counsel and their families during a prolonged safety lockdown. The Committee directs DOJ to conduct a study, and report its findings not later than September 30, 2021, on protocols followed by facilities operated by BOP and those housing BOP detainees in private contracted facilities, including those on a contractual agreement basis with other Federal agencies. The report should identify what conditions would warrant a lockdown longer than 72 hours; whether lockdowns lasting longer than 72 hours would constitute a violation of the Federal right, as defined in section 3626, under Subchapter C of chapter 229 of Part II of title 18, United States Code; and specify any conditions or factors, in combination with such lockdown, that may violate such Federal right. In addition, the report shall include: (1) the number of facilities that experienced a facility lockdown longer than 72 hours in fiscal year 2021, and for each lockdown instance, provide a detailed explanation, including documented justifications for the lockdown, accommodations provided to meet inmate medical, dietary and hygiene needs and any arrangements to facilitate access to logal coursel; (2) BOP protocols could not be followed; and (3) a review of BOP contingency plans to ensure detainee access to coursel or family in lockdowns that exceed 72 hours, including data on the number of facilities and detainees, in fiscal year 2021, whose access was restricted in such circumstances, and identifying best practices to ensure that timely communication can be maintained."

16. House Report (H. Rept. 116-455) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "The Lieutenant Osvaldo Albarati Correctional Officer Self-Protection Act of 2018 (Section 202 of the First Step Act (Public Law 115-391)) requires that each Federal penal or correctional institution provide a secure storage area located outside of the secure perimeter of the institution for employees to store firearms or allow employees to store firearms in a vehicle lockbox. The Committee recognizes the importance of this provision in ensuring BOP employee safety, and directs the BOP Director to provide the storage facilities required under the Act not later than the end of fiscal year 2021; to submit to the Committee an implementation plan for this by no later than 90 days after enactment of this Act; and to provide quarterly progress reports until completion."

17. The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "For fiscal year 2021, within the funding provided, the Department is directed to continue following the directives in Senate Report 116-127, as adopted by Public Law 116-93, on the following topics: "First Step Act (FSA) Implementation," "Additional Requirements of the FSA," "Residential Reentry Centers (RRC)," and "Freedom of Information Act Records".

Regarding "First Step Act (FSA) Implementation," the Senate Report (S. Rept. 116-127) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2020 (P.L. 116-93) states, "The Department is directed to report to both the Committees on Appropriations and Judiciary, within 90 days of enactment of this act, and every 90 days thereafter, on all actions and expenditures to implement the FSA, including activities, expenditures and resource requirements to develop, implement, review, validate, and maintain the risk and needs assessment and to evaluate and provide evidence-based recidivism reduction programs and productive activities."

18. (Additional FSA requirements; 2 reports) The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "For fiscal year 2021, within the funding provided, the Department is directed to continue following the directives in Senate Report 116-127, as adopted by Public Law 116-93, on the following topics: "First Step Act (FSA) Implementation," "Additional Requirements of the FSA," "Residential Reentry Centers," and "Freedom of Information Act Records".

Further, BOP is directed to, among other directives, continue following the "Additional Requirements of the FSA" language from Senate Report 116-127 on pages 106 to 107. The Senate Report (S. Rept. 116-127) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2020 (P.L. 116-93) states, "Additional Requirements of the FSA.—Section 102 of the FSA requires the Attorney General to develop policies for the warden of each BOP facility to enter into partnerships with non-governmental and faith-based organizations to provide evidence-based recidivism reduction programming or productive activities for inmates at a reduced cost or no cost to the Federal Government. Such partnerships have been successful in dozens of States, reducing crime rates and helping to restore the lives of the incarcerated. Because the FSA requires BOP to provide a majority of inmates with the opportunity to participate in recidivism reduction programming or productive activities, it is imperative for the Department to quickly identify and engage in opportunities to increase available programming through non-governmental sources. The Committee therefore directs the Attorney General to issue guidance and policies for recidivism reduction partnerships, as required under section 102 of Public Law 115–391, not later than 30 days after the date of enactment of this act."

"Additionally, the Act requires BOP to assist inmates applying for Federal and State benefits as well as obtaining critical identification for re-entry, including a social security card, driver's license or other official photo identification, and birth certificate. Within 45 days of enactment of this act, BOP is directed to provide a status report to the Committees on Appropriations and Judiciary indicating the guidance issued to BOP staff as well as a description of how these additional requirements are being met, including the number of inmates receiving assistance in securing benefits and identification, any difficulties BOP is encountering in obtaining these documents, and the list of organizations partnering with BOP to include the programming provided by each organization for each facility. The Committee further directs BOP to provide quarterly reports to the Committees on Appropriations and Judiciary with updated information on both **recidivism reduction partnerships** and **assistance with obtaining identification** and benefits."

19. The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "BOP shall continue to submit quarterly reports on inmate-to-correctional officer ratio as required by the explanatory statement accompanying Public Law 116-93, and to publish these reports on the BOP website. To the extent BOP does not currently record staffing by shift, it is directed to begin doing so and include such metrics in this report by the end of fiscal year 2021. Separately, BOP shall submit a report to the Committees regarding any incident involving the use of deadly force at an institution with a staffing ratio greater than 15:1, explaining any role staffing levels may have played in the incident, and describing a detailed plan to prevent recurrence of such incidents."

Further, the House Report (H. Rept. 116-455) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "The Committee directs BOP to continue to submit quarterly reports on the inmate-to-correctional officer ratio at each facility, using the OPM definition of a corrections officer, broken out by security level and shift, including confirmation that at least two correctional officers are on duty for each shift at BOP facilities that house high security inmates, as specified in the fiscal year 2020 Appropriations Act."

20. The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "BOP is directed to continue to report quarterly on the number of individuals who are screened for MAT, are seeking MAT, have received MAT, or are on a wait list for MAT. These categories should be further broken out by institution or residential reentry center (RRC) and type of MAT."

Further, The House Report (H. Rept. 116-455) accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), states, "The Committee encourages the Bureau of Prisons to make abstinence-based relapse prevention treatment options available to inmates with a history of opioid dependence."

21. The Committee is aware of concerns about uneven levels of medical service provided in its system, particularly for inmates who may have language disadvantages or be temporarily in BOP custody and thus have limited ability to convey concerns about such service. "BOP is directed to submit a report to the Committee not later than June 1, 2021, on medical services provided in fiscal year 2020, by facility, that includes the following information: (1) the ratio of medical providers (doctors, nurses, and paramedics) to inmates; (2) qualifications of such medical providers; (3) the process by which inmates may file complaints, and the number and type of complaints filed; and (4) actions taken by BOP in response to complaints".
